## THE CHILD & YOUTH ADVOCACY CENTRE OF KELOWNA

**In a perfect world, there would be no need for a Child & Youth Advocacy Centre because every child would be safe, loved, and nurtured. Until that world exists, we are here to ensure that children who have experienced abuse, neglect, and emotional harm receive the compassionate and trauma-informed care they deserve.**

**A**s one of more than 50 such Centres across Canada, the CYAC of Kelowna is part of a growing best practice in the response to child abuse and neglect. Bringing community and government agencies together under one child-friendly roof, we coordinate a unified response to child maltreatment that prioritizes the needs of vulnerable children. We support the investigation of cases of child abuse and go beyond investigation to focus on healing through the direct provision of onsite services and referrals in meaningful collaboration with our partners.

# A MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADERSHIP



## PLANTING THE Seeds...

A seed is just a seed, right? A tiny little thing, it is seemingly rather insignificant, so small that it presents a clear vulnerability. Easily lost, easily damaged, easily robbed of its potential... but under the right circumstances with the right care, it can become something so much more than what it appears to be in its early form.

For a tiny seed to even have a chance at reaching that potential, so many factors must come together: the right location, the right exposure to sunlight and shade, access to life-giving water, the presence of invaluable nutrients within the soil that surrounds it, and protection from all the things that would cause it harm. When any one of these elements goes out of balance, vulnerability invades. A seed is not just a

seed; under the right circumstances and with support in place, it is the beginning of something.

Contemplating this year's annual report, I was sitting on my back patio staring at what has become my first ever successful attempt at growing tomatoes. I've tried in the past and something has always worked against the ability of these little fruits to thrive under my care. Despite my lack of a green thumb, I was determined to help these plants reach their potential.

It all began in the spring... with a seed. With seed in hand, sun on my face and soil at my feet, I knew that I had to have the right conversations with the right people to fill in the gaps in my knowledge. I needed to understand what I haven't in previous years and find out what was working against the potential of this mighty little seed... and with all of that new knowledge and support in place – voilà! – a great big, beautiful bounty of Okanagan tomatoes!

Ten years ago, a seed was planted in Kelowna in the form of an idea: could we bring a Child & Youth Advocacy Centre to life in our community? Through partnership, vision, and persistence that idea has taken root and flourished into a robust Centre of Excellence with the needs of children at its heart.

So, this report is a story of growth, of looking at the seeds of change that we have planted along the way, and the interconnected elements that nurture not only the children we serve but the Centre itself. It is a story of how so many factors must come together to support bold ideas and achieve change.

## KEY ELEMENTS OF GROWTH AND EVOLUTION

On any given day, children and youth come to us for forensic interviews, medical appointments, clinical counselling, court preparation, victim services, remote testimony, and more as they journey toward healing. With trauma-informed and compassionate care, we create space for hope to flourish. So amidst all of this activity, we are also working tirelessly to evolve those systems - planting seeds of change and nurturing them to become strong and resilient - to serve children and families better. In the past year, our garden has grown in some truly impactful ways.



### BECOMING THE CYAC

Though we have always served children and youth under 19, at the start of 2024 we added two small but important words to our name to evolve from Child Advocacy Centre to Child & Youth Advocacy Centre, a natural next step as we strive to be as inclusive as possible for all those who access our services.

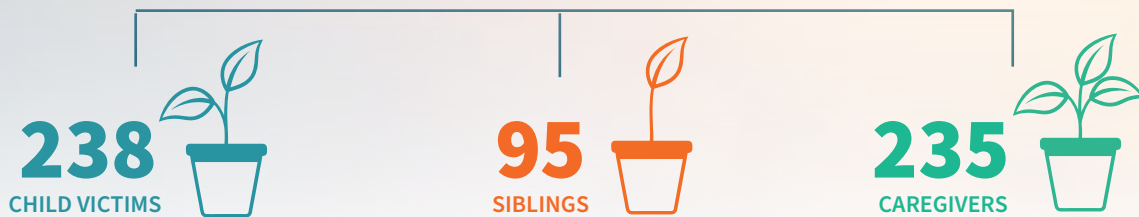

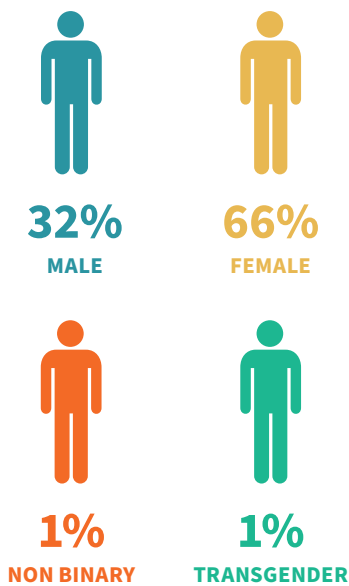
# OUR IMPACT

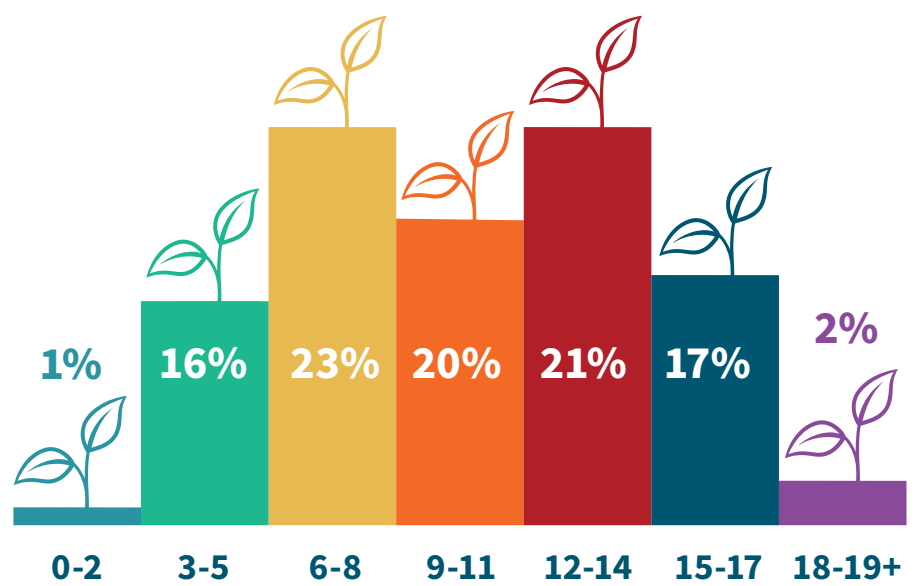

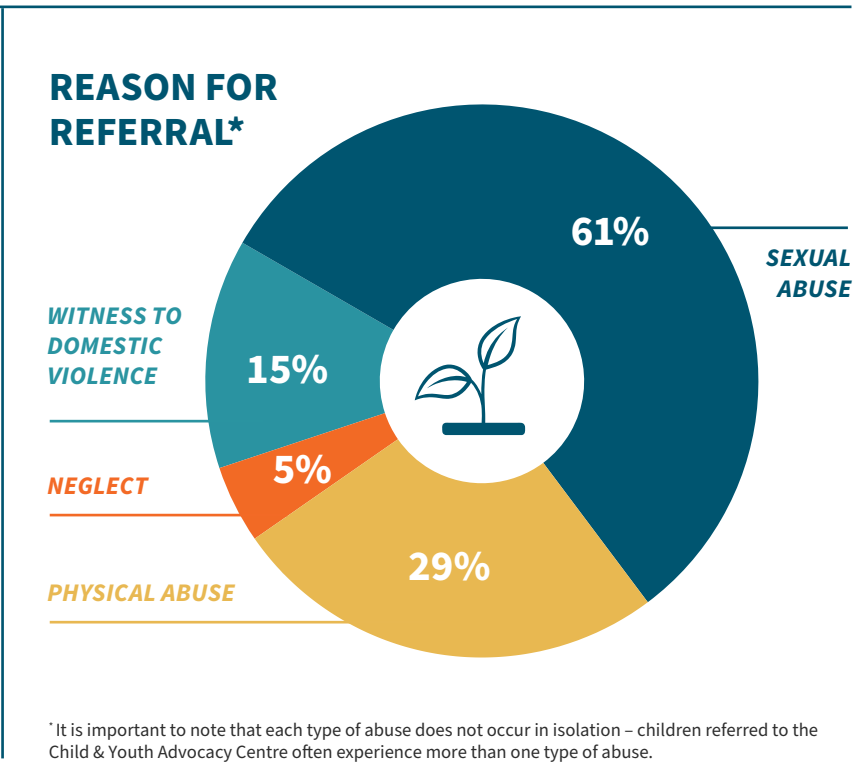
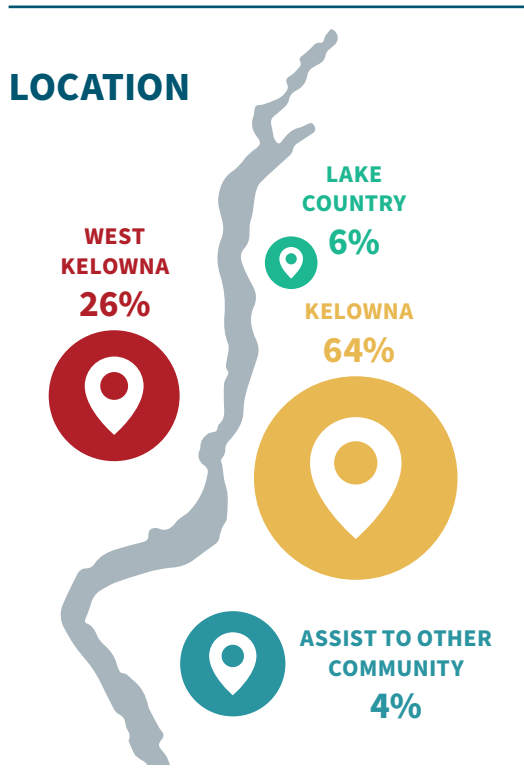

Depending on the needs of the child, some or all of our programs and services will be activated. Activations of service include forensic interviews, medical care, clinical counselling, court preparation, victim services, remote testimony, and more.



# RESEARCH & EVALUATION



**Rooted in a commitment to excellence and innovation, our Research and Evaluation Program lays the foundation for strategic action and systemic change by deepening our understanding of the complex issues facing vulnerable children and youth and providing valuable insight into how we can continue to serve them better. Grounded in the philosophy that research informs practice and practice informs research, we are dedicated to nurturing a multi-disciplinary approach that grows stronger with every child and family we serve. By sharing our knowledge with key stakeholders in our community and across the country, we are planting seeds of change and championing policies that promote the safety and well-being of children and youth in the Okanagan and beyond.**

## RESEARCH

**A**n investment in the safety and well-being of children and youth now and in the future, research projects undertaken at the Centre will inform the work of CYACs here and around the world. Projects from the past year include:

### CULTURAL RESPONSIVITY AUDIT

At the CYAC, we strive to cultivate safe spaces for children and families from all walks of life. In partnership with local Indigenous leaders, we are undertaking an evaluation of our policies, programs, and practices to advance our team's understanding of what it means to be trauma-informed and culturally safe for all those who walk through our doors. We aim to be sensitive and adapt to the unique social, cultural, and historical contexts that impact Indigenous children and families, a journey we recognize has no end. By sharing what we learn with our colleagues in the BC Network of CYACs and those engaged in this work at the national and international levels, we will continue to break new ground in evolving best practices to support the safety and well-being of children here and around the world. In partnership with local Indigenous leaders, we are undertaking an evaluation of our policies, programs, and practices to advance our team's understanding of what it means to be trauma-informed and culturally safe.

### NATIONAL REMOTE TESTIMONY EVALUATION

By removing the possibility of coming face to face with the accused, remote testimony safeguards the right of children and youth to seek justice while maintaining their safety and emotional well-being. Rigorous research is required to demonstrate its effectiveness in preserving the accuracy of testimonies to make the case for the expansion of this model to CYACs across the country. Findings from this study will ultimately empower the growth of remote testimony access so that every young survivor who bravely speaks their truth to court can do so in a safe and trauma-informed environment.

## EVALUATION

Continuous assessment and evaluation allow us to make informed decisions that nurture the safety and well-being of those we serve. As part of our commitment to excellence in the provision of child abuse services, we have woven thorough evaluative practices into every aspect of our work at the CYAC, ensuring that we are planting seeds for ongoing improvement and evolution.

### HOW DO WE EVALUATE OUR PROGRAMS AND SERVICES?

- 1 After each activation of service, members of our multi-disciplinary team (MDT) complete a **short survey** to provide their immediate feedback.
- 2 Team members provide **in-depth feedback** on the first case of each month, cultivating both quantitative and qualitative data.
- 3 Children, youth, and their safe caregivers are invited to share their feedback through surveys to ensure that **families have a voice** in the way they experience support.
- 4 **Case studies** and **reviews** are undertaken to provide in-depth insights into the MDT’s decision-making and case management processes.
- 5 Our **research and evaluation projects** further contribute to this effort by ensuring our programs remain aligned with best practices and meet the evolving needs of children and families, fostering continuous improvement.

### SURVEYS OF OUR COLLABORATIVE MODEL SHOW:

- 93%** of MDT agree that the CYAC model **helped provide a timely response**
- 94%** of MDT agree that the CYAC model **resulted in a more collaborative approach**
- 91%** of MDT agree that the CYAC model **resulted in a coordinated planning process**
- 91%** of MDT agree that the CYAC model **benefited the child being interviewed**

# MULTI-DISCIPLINARY RESPONSE PROGRAM

The Multi-Disciplinary Response (MDR) Program is the lifeblood of our partner-based approach to coordinated care and the very essence of our service delivery model, where we collaborate to ensure that the seeds of hope within the children and youth we serve have all that they need to grow and thrive.

**CHILD INTERVIEWS** are the root of what we do. Creating an environment where a child can find the courage to share their truth requires hours of meticulous preparation, specialized training, and sensitivity to each child's unique needs. Every child interview demands careful planning, coordination, execution, and reflection. Not only are these interviews essential for the pursuit of criminal justice outcomes, they provide children with a vital first step on their journey to healing.

**CASE CONFERENCES** are where we come together to cultivate a holistic understanding of the unique needs of each child. Before the CYAC, agencies traditionally worked in silos, preventing them from acting as a team on behalf of a child's best interest. Case conferences nurture inter-agency connections where system gaps have historically existed, bringing the child's team together to identify and address their needs and ensure their file is moving forward.

**MDR MEETINGS** nourish our efforts each week at the CYAC. Members of our multi-disciplinary team – police, child protection, health care, victim services, child advocates, and community service agencies – come together to advance the work of serving and protecting children. This is where we cultivate shared knowledge, nurture system change, and grow our collaborative vision.

# CHILD AND FAMILY ADVOCACY PROGRAM

The Child and Family Advocacy (CFA) Program nurtures the seeds of hope within every child and family who walk through our doors by serving three critical functions:

The first is to act as a **single point of contact** and provide continuity for the families we serve. Ultimately, this places an Advocate beside each family, a supportive liaison who they can rely on as they grow stronger and more resilient on their journey to healing. Before the CYAC, families were left to navigate these systems alone. Now, they have their Child and Family Advocate alongside them as an ally for the best interests of the child.

The second essential function of the CFA Program is to provide a **bird's eye view** of each case. Every case is like a complex ecosystem, involving various agencies and services within the Centre and across communities. The Advocate

coordinates with all the necessary agencies and service providers to prevent any gaps in care, weeding out potential vulnerabilities to make way for growth and healing. By cultivating collaboration and communication, the CFA Program ensures a **seamless wrap-around model of care**.

The third core function of the Program is to work as an extension of the existing service agencies, allowing our partnership to grow our collective capacity and better support families by working together. When partner agency mandates end, the Advocate role can often step in to offer a **continuation of service**, providing an additional layer of support as well as referrals to appropriate resources for children and families.

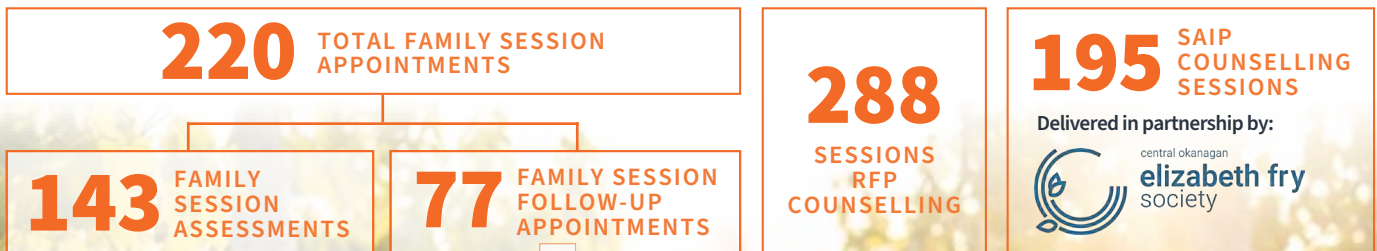
# RESILIENT FAMILIES HEALTH & WELLNESS PROGRAM

## MENTAL HEALTH

Recognizing that growth and healing do not happen in isolation, the Resilient Families Program (RFP) is dedicated to addressing the complex mental health needs of children and families affected by trauma. The goal: to understand the life each child aspires to lead, identify the mental health barriers standing in their way, and provide targeted support and resources so that they may grow into the future they deserve. By working with children and youth to get to the root of their primary concerns, the RFP team digs deep to make a lasting difference for the individuals as well as their families and our community.

## PROGRAM EVOLUTION & GROWTH

Over the past year, the RFP team have finalized our **Family Session** process, refining the therapeutic approaches we employ to ensure we get to the root causes of trauma and nurture long-term resilience and healing in the children and families we serve. Grounded in comprehensive evidence-based assessments that capture the unique perspectives of the child, their siblings, and their non-offending caregivers, this process develops a holistic picture of the trauma and its impacts. From there, our team of professionals collaborate to identify main concerns and provide treatment options, including on-site services as well as referrals to community partners. Ultimately, families are empowered to make choices around their next steps on the path to healing.

## MEDICAL CLINIC

Adaptation and evolution take time, but through these processes roots grow deeper, building resilience and laying the groundwork for enduring growth. In partnership with Interior Health, we are transforming the way children and youth impacted by abuse and neglect experience care in the Central Okanagan. This past year marked a milestone in the evolution of our on-site medical clinic with the announcement of a permanent full-time Clinic Coordinator. Working in conjunction with a pediatrician and registered nurse, they ensure that vulnerable children and youth receive the healthcare they need in their own community in a space where they already feel safe and believed.

In collaboration with our RFP team, the clinic provides holistic support for the children and youth we serve grounded in an understanding of the interconnectivity of physical and mental health. Together, we nurture hope and provide a clear pathway for vulnerable children to receive the comprehensive care they need to heal and move forward.

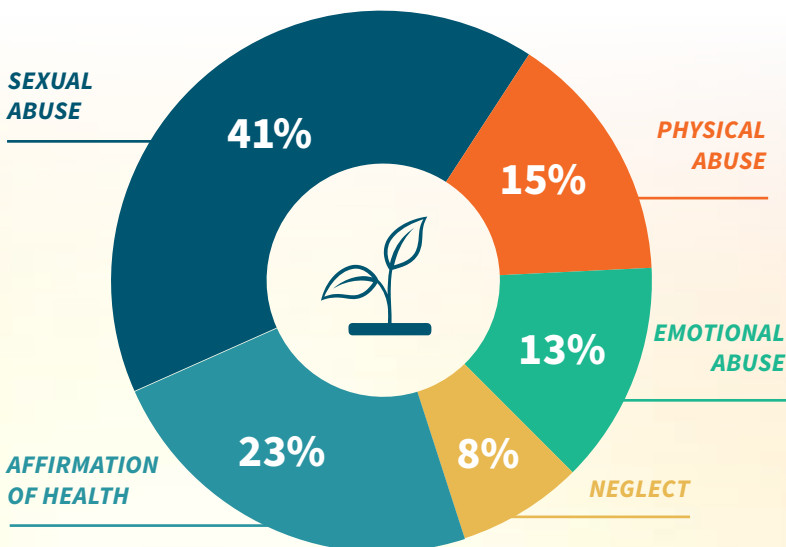

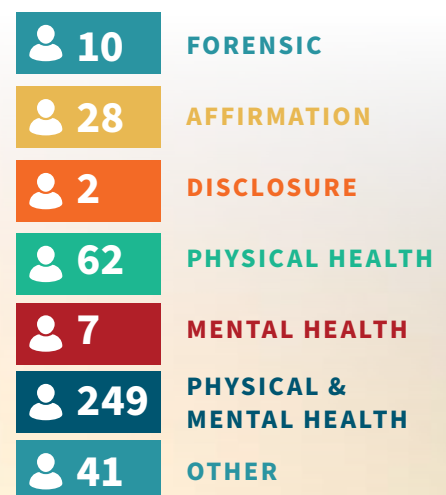
### REFERRAL SOURCE

# EMERGENCY SERVICES PROGRAM



**Designed to adapt to the unique needs of children and families, the Emergency Services Program (ESP) is activated based on the input and recommendations of our multi-disciplinary team. Established with visionary support from one family, this program plants seeds of hope across our community by proactively removing barriers to healing for the vulnerable families we serve, ensuring they have access to every possible opportunity to heal and thrive.**

**W**e collaborate with service providers throughout the Central Okanagan to meet the comprehensive needs of children and families. However, there are often gaps between what services are available and what families need to move forward; the ESP steps in to fill those gaps.

## REMOVING BARRIERS TO HEALING

### Access to Community

The experience of abuse can be isolating. Sometimes as part of cultivating resilience and working towards recovery, children and their non-offending caregivers need to find new ways to grow healthy connections to community. The ESP makes it possible for vulnerable children to build safe community through camps and recreational programs that may not otherwise be accessible.

### Beds/Bedding

We cannot expect a child to find rest in a place where they do not feel safe. For children impacted by sexual violence, moving forward can be difficult if they are sleeping in the same place they were harmed. Sometimes their

bedding and mattresses are removed and taken into evidence as part of the investigative process. The ESP allows children to find peace in the comfort of their new bedding and linens.

### Physiotherapy

Children and youth who have experienced abuse may require additional healthcare services to recover from acute injuries and disabilities. Physiotherapy can help them manage the immediate physical impacts of abuse while also supporting their long-term physical and mental well-being. The ESP ensures that every child impacted receives the care they need by nurturing strength and resilience through physical activity.

### Specialized Counselling

The mental health needs of children and families impacted by abuse can be highly complex and may require skills, experience, and expertise not found in our embedded multi-disciplinary team. In these cases, our team digs deep to locate these services elsewhere in the community. Through the ESP, we can ensure families have access to the services that meet their unique needs.

### Transportation

For those without access to a vehicle, just getting to the CYAC can be a challenging experience. Lack of transportation should never stand in the way of children and families accessing the services they need to move forward and heal. The ESP ensures that every child who needs to attend the CYAC can find their way here safely.

“This year, access to summer camp changed the trajectory of one family’s healing journey. It provided the child with space to feel like a kid again, to play and be carefree in a way they hadn’t been able to in a long time. Knowing they were safe and supported, their caregiver was able to go back to work. 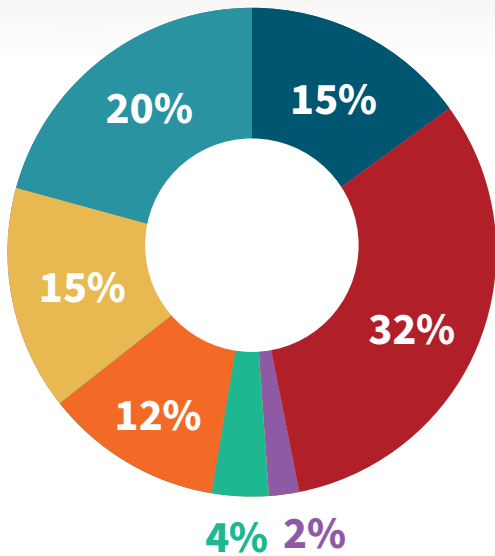
